## Message of the Vice-Chancellor

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The University of Ruhuna was able to perform successfully in the year 2022 by addressing the challenges faced in the year 2021 by introducing novel technologies and with well-organized strategies. The year 2022 was the fourth of our five year Corporate Plan is from 01.01.2019 to 31.12.2023.

After the *Covid* 19 pandemic situation of the world in 2020 the university was commenced the virtual learning platform and it was further developed and undergraduates were able to continue their education (Lectures as well as examinations) without interruption. The university was able to hold the convocation with two occasions in March and in December 2022 for conferment the degrees of Ruhuna graduands. There were 3846 graduands graduated in these two convocations. By conducting the convocation during one day for each convocation the university was able to minimize the budget allocation.

During the year the university was able to host three international symposia/conferences. During the year Academic Sessions, Quality Assurance Sessions, Vice Chancellor's Award Session were conducted successfully.

It is my pleasure to mention the achievements in 2022, the University of Ruhuna obtained 'Very Good' grade at the Institutional Review conducted in 2021 by the Quality Assurance Council of the University Grants Commission. The University of Ruhuna won the Bronze Award for the Annual Report and Accounts – 2020 at the Best Annual Report Award ceremony organized by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka in association with the Association of Public Finance Accounts of Sri Lanka (APFASL) held on 02<sup>nd</sup> December, 2022 at the BMICH, Colombo.

Both academics and staff members at the university received many achievements in creative areas and sports fields. 'Young Women Engineer' (YWE) of the year 2022 was awarded by the Lecturer of the Department of Electrical and Information Engineering. A student from Medical Faculty secured a Bronze medal for Sri Lanka National Novices Weightlifting Championship – 2022.

The University established two new departments for the Faculty of Management and Finance and one department for the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences.

Our endeavor is to create a conducive environment for learning, research and creativity for both academics and staff members. To succeed in that effort we were able to

conduct many workshops including motivational workshops, student counselor workshops and meditation and moderation workshops. To improve the quality of the staff members, we were able to conduct training programmes, capacity developments programmes for both academic and non-academic staff members.

To build up a strong international collaboration, we were able to sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the University of Presov, Slovakia; the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology, Australia; the University of Stavanger, Norway; and other local institutes in Sri Lanka.

Analyzing the past to prepare for the future is important. To sum up the year 2022 was full of successes of the University of Ruhuna. We are on our way to achieving the Goals set out in our Corporate Plan. By the year 2022, the University of Ruhuna is standing with a reputation that exists for 44 years. 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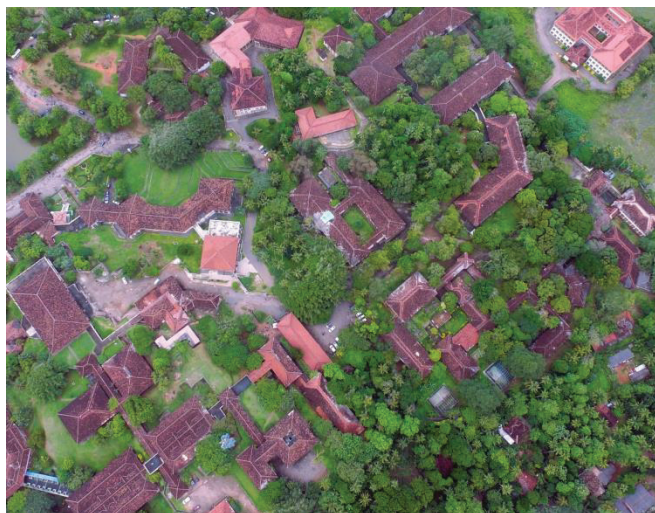
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# **Part I**

## **General Information**

## Introduction to University of Ruhuna



Ruhuna University College, the precursor of the University of Ruhuna (UOR), was declared open by then the Prime Minister Mr. J.R. Jayawardene on 27<sup>th</sup> of August in 1978. The pioneering faculties, namely, Faculty of Agriculture, Faculty of Science, Faculty of Medicine and Faculty of Humanities of Social Sciences were affiliated to the University of Peradeniya, University of Colombo and University of Kelaniya in

the beginning. The Ruhuna University College had been functioning at the premises of the Technical College, Meddawatta, Matara for over six years. Having elevated to a fully-fledged university status with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> February 1984, UOR was formally established in a masterpiece architectural complex on a picturesque hillock facing the Indian Ocean at Wellamadama, Matara, Sri Lanka.

The Faculty of Agriculture is located at Mapalana, Kamburupitiya. The Faculty of Medicine located at Karapitiya, Galle and other two faculties; Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences and Faculty of Science are located at the Matara Wellamadama premises.

Subsequently, six more faculties were established. The Faculty of Engineering was established in 1999 in Galle and the Faculty of Management and Finance was established in 2003 at the main campus in Wellamadama. Further, Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology was established in 2005 also at the main campus being the first of its kind in the entire University system in the country. The Faculty of Graduate Studies was incepted in 2011. The recent additions to the UOR include the Faculty of Technology in Kamburupitiya in 2016 and the Faculty of Allied Health Sciences in Karapitiya at Galle in 2017.

With 12,468 internal undergraduates, over 18000 external undergraduates, 1,344 postgraduates and 626 academic staff, University of Ruhuna is regarded one of the leading higher education institute in Sri Lanka. With ten Faculties, UOR is the most diversified Sri Lankan University while being the second largest in terms of student numbers. Webometric Ranking of 2022 placed UOR at 5<sup>th</sup> among Sri Lankan Universities and 2336<sup>th</sup> among world Universities.

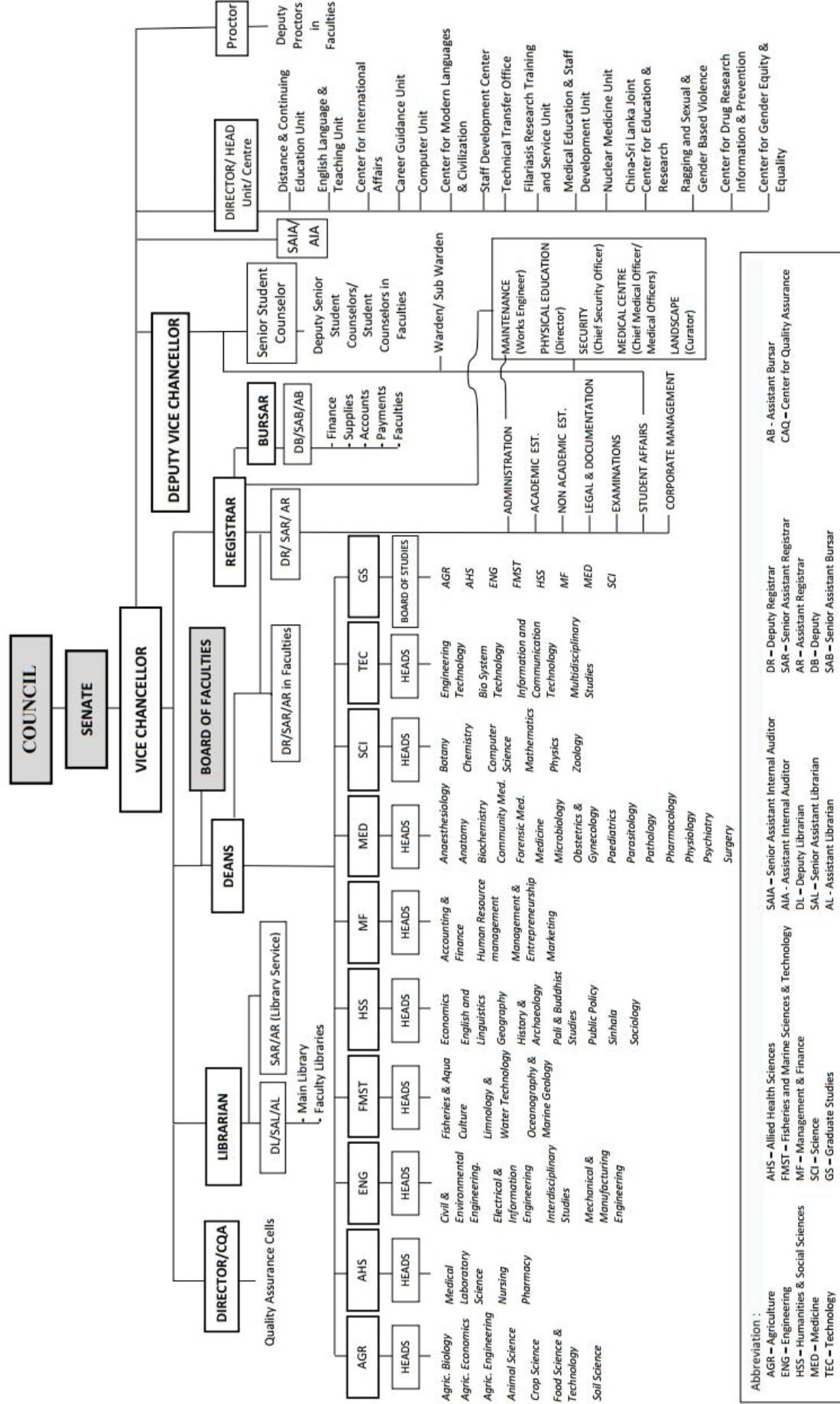

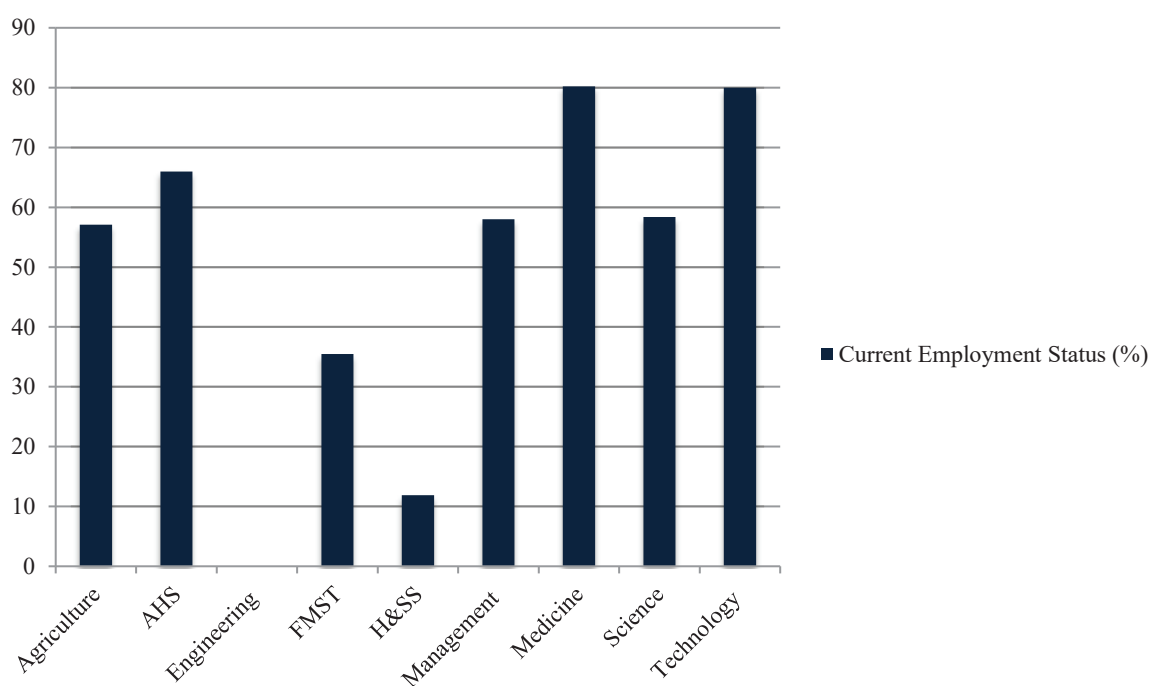

## Faculty of Agriculture

### Dean's Statement

Faculty managed the year 2022 reasonably well with COVID – 19 pandemic in the early part of the year and later the fuel and energy crisis that prevailed in the country. The academic program and other regular activities of the Faculty functioned throughout the year due to well adapted practices and commitment of the staff.

Lectures and examinations were conducted in online and physical modes and the Faculty managed to conduct academic activities physically in the last quarter of the year. LMS software system of the Faculty was upgraded to the latest version with enhanced features and capacity. In supporting online teaching and learning activities and examinations, Computer Unit is equipped with 3 high end servers. The expansion of the Wi-Fi network is also in the process.

Faculty is currently in the process of developing 5 new degree programs namely BSc in Agro- Industry Innovation and

Technology Management, BSc in Food Technology and Nutritional Science, BSc in Crop Production and Forest Technology, BSc in Biodiversity Conservation and Agro-Ecosystem Management and BSc in Applied Plant Molecular Biology. Faculty is planning to commence new degree programs with the admission of students from A/L 2023 intake.

Establishment of the Smart Agro-ecosystem Based Resilience Center (fully-equipped modern resource center with a state-of-the-art ICT facility) by the BRITAE funded by EU grant is progressing well and Faculty is involved with several projects funded by the international agencies.

From my perspective, Faculty of Agriculture performed well during the year 2022 and I am delighted to work with a committed group of staff members and students.

## Faculty of Engineering

### Dean's Statement

At the beginning of the year Dr. H. C. Ambawatte, Senior Lecturer attached to the Department of Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering was appointed as the 6th Dean of the Faculty of Engineering with effect from 1st January, 2022 succeeding Dr. H. P. Sooriyarachchi, Senior Lecturer, attach to the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> batch with 521 students was admitted to the Faculty of Engineering on 28<sup>th</sup> February 2022.

Due to the increased intake of students, there are 24 development projects identified and proposal has already been submitted to UGC for approval and among them three of the projects are in National Planning level.

The survey work camp for the 20<sup>th</sup> batch (EG/2018) of students specializing in the field of Civil and Environmental Engineering stream was commenced from 7<sup>th</sup> February at Wellamadama, Complex, University of Ruhuna and was completed on 20<sup>th</sup> February 2022. The Engineering Education Center of the Faculty arranged three-months and six -months industrial trainings for E2017 – 19<sup>th</sup> batch of 250

students and E2018 – 20<sup>th</sup> batch of 230 students respectively for the Engineering undergraduates at various industries in Sri Lanka with the support of National Apprentice and Industrial Training.

11th Undergraduate Research Symposium on Recent Advances in Civil Engineering is scheduled for 10<sup>th</sup> August 2022. This symposium was organized by the Civil and Environmental Engineering Society (CEES) of the department. All final year undergraduates (80) presented their final year research projects in the symposium in five parallel technical sessions

EU Erasmus plus funded THREE Lanka project completed one year period by 15<sup>th</sup> January 2022 and progressing well. This project is coordinated by Dept. of Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering and contributed by four foreign partners and 6 local partners. It consists of 10 Work Packages focusing development of certificate programs for technicians, engineers and project managers on renewable energy technology and projects. As a technology hub, five modern laboratories are also developing to cater the needs of the above certificate programs and undergraduate education, and research.

## Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology

### Dean's Statement

The year 2022 marked as the 17<sup>th</sup> year the Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology, established in 2005. Currently, the Faculty is conducting two-degree programs; viz, BScHons in Fisheries and Marine Sciences and BScHons in Marine and Freshwater Sciences. With respect to the former, Faculty has graduated 12 batches of graduates specialized in the fields of Fisheries, Aquaculture, Limnology, Oceanography, and Marine Geology, and Limnology and Water Technology. The second batch of students graduated from the latter program specializing in Oceanography & Marine Geology or Limnology & Water Technology. Faculty increased the annual student intake to 210 in 2022 for two-degree programs. To cater the country's needs and increase the student intake, Faculty has initiated to introduce a new degree program of BScHons in Marine Services and Resource Management jointly with the Faculty of Management and Finance. Three short courses named customary law, national and international legislations applicable to fisheries, Ornamental fish breeding and culture, and Fish Post-harvest Techniques have been developed and planned to initiate

through DCEU of the University. Faculty have taken necessary steps to graduate students without delay, clearing backlogs created by COVID-19 pandemic and Economic crises.

The faculty has continuously conducted outreach activities and provided service to society such as through the Service laboratory at the Department of Limnology and Water Technology for testing water and wastewater of industries in the southern province as a registered laboratory in the Central Environmental Authority of Sri Lanka. Students, staff, and Alumni of the Faculty conducted several webinars for knowledge and experience sharing with society. The National services rendered by the Academic staff include Prof. KHMA Deepananda as a member of the steering committee for of NSF for fisheries and Prof TPD Gamage as the Director of the Quality Assurance Council of the UGC in 2022.

The faculty members have published 19 articles in internationally indexed journals and 55 abstracts at different forums in 2022. In addition, the number of citations received during the year 2022 was nearly 450 for the research published by the staff.

## Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences

### Dean's Statement

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the University of Ruhuna operate under its mission "To produce quality graduates with professional skills and to generate knowledge in the humanities and social sciences through cutting-edge research". The faculty offers 12 Bachelor of Arts Honors degree programmes namely Bachelor of Arts Honors in English, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Economics, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Social Statistics, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Archaeology, Bachelor of Arts Honors in History, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Sociology, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Geography, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Sinhala, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Buddhist Studies in Buddhist Culture, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Buddhist Studies in Buddhist Philosophy, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Pali and Bachelor of Arts Honors in Political Science. The faculty composed of 10 academic departments including the newly established Department of Information Technology and the Center for Modern Languages and Civilization (CMLC) which offers 07 Advanced Certificate Courses on modern languages

A brief review of the faculty in the year 2022 is given below under the goals of the university.

**Expanding access to education, research and services** - The faculty continued its academic programmes and offered newly introduced/ revised 12 degree programmes in the year 2022 as well. Despite the limitations of the faculty in terms of physical infrastructure, 721 students were enrolled in the reviewing year as well. One of the remarkable achievements of the faculty during the year was establishment of a new Department of Information

Technology (DIT). This new department was able to prepare syllabus and proposal for a new degree programme on Bachelor of Arts in Information Technology by addressing a long felt need of the faculty. Another proposal for a degree programme on Bachelor of Geographical Information Science was completed and obtained the Senate and Council approval to be submitted for the UGC approval. Three new proposals are being developed by the Departments of Sociology, Public Policy and Economics under the objective of introduce new undergraduate degree programmes. A proposal for a new Post Graduate Diploma in Education was completed and obtained Senate approval during the year. One Advanced Certificate course in sustainable Peace through Inclusive Service Delivery and a Diploma course on Historical Studies were added to the distance learning courses while continuing existing Diploma/ Higher Diploma in English and Diploma in Psychological Counselling. Two new distance courses are being prepared by the Department of Sinhala and the Department of Public Policy. Under the objective of new online courses, Department of Sociology has prepared syllabus for Diploma in Human Rights and Social Inclusion while the Department of Pali and Buddhist Studies and the Department of Sinhala have commenced preparation of two online courses. To establish partnerships with the international organizations, negotiations continued with several universities in Russia, India, Norway, Bangladesh and the Czech Republic.

The faculty continued its publications, and 04 issues of the Journal on Social Sciences and Humanities Review was published

during the year 2022. Department level journals and newsletters were published by 05 departments of the faculty. The Research and Publication Centre on Humanities and Social Sciences conducted several workshops and events to create a research culture among staff and students of the faculty.

**Enriching quality of education -**

Approximately 90% of the faculty's academic staff have post graduate qualifications. The percentage of PhD holders of the faculty is remained low when compared with the expected achievement (70%) of the University. The percentage of PhD academics of the faculty marginally increased from 43% to the 45% during the year 2022. The faculty is continually encouraging its academics to complete PhDs and as a result already 10 academics have been registered and following PhDs. The faculty was able to achieved its targets related to automated administrative systems (70%) and implementation of a fully automated Learning Management System (LMS-100%) and Management Information System (MIS-100%) for the teaching – learning process and as well as for the student and examination management. The faculty was able to establish a new computer lab with 100 computers under the additional intake/ AHEAD funding. 30 Wi-Fi access points have been ordered under the additional intake funding to provide Wi-Fi facilities to all students and staff of the faculty.

**Enhancing relevance of education and research -**

The faculty has continued offering newly introduced/ revised 04 year 12 degree programmes. The Curricular Development Committee of the faculty with the inputs from the IQAC of the faculty completed a mid-review of the all 12 degree programmes to be further improved the curricular as per the

requirements of the society. The newly enrolled students of the faculty were provided an English Language and ICT intensive course in the year 2022 as well. Although, the employment rate of the graduates are still at low level when compared with the expectations of the university, the faculty has done its maximum to produce employable graduates with knowledge and skills not only related to the subject disciplines but also in various other aspects including the leadership skills, vision of the life and mindset paradigm. The Career Guidance Cell of the faculty in collaboration with the CGU conducted several workshops/ training programmes to enhance student's skills to be faced in the job market. Internship has been incorporated into all the current 12 degree programmes and the other degree programmes that we prepared and being prepared to be implemented also incorporated internships as compulsory subject to provide on the job training to the undergraduates. 05 degree programmes of the faculty provided internships to the students in the year 2022.

**Ensuring justice and equity with respect to gender, ethnicity, religion and differently-abled Persons -**

The faculty offers degree programmes both in Sinhala and English medium. Course modules of Tamil Language Skills and Sinhala Language Skills have been incorporated in the syllabus of all the 12 degree programmes as compulsory subjects. The faculty enrolled 05 students under the disability category in the year 2022 and continued education for previously enrolled students with disabilities. The Erasmus+ funded project on Developing Inclusive Education for Students with Disabilities (IncEdu) were continued in the year 2022 as well and established a special needs students unit catering the needs of students with disabilities in the faculties of the university. 06 workshops were conducted

for the students, academic and nonacademic staff on inclusive education to ensure justice and equity for students with disabilities. The Centre for Modern Languages and Civilization of the faculty, revised curricular and offered advanced certificate courses on Tamil, Chinese, French, Hindi, German and Japanese languages for the undergraduates of the university benefiting to more than 3000 undergraduates. Department of Public Policy in partnerships with National Peace Council, conducted a series of workshops to improve students' knowledge on pluralism and peace and harmony. They also introduced an advanced certificate course on Inclusive Service Delivery to be offered under the DCEU. Department of Pali and Buddhist Studies and the student societies of the faculty organized several

multi-cultural events contributing for social harmony among the students. The faculty has established a Student Welfare Fund (SWF) with the monthly contribution from its academic staff members. The SWF provided financial supports to around 60 students who were in dire needs during the year 2022.

**Enhancing good governance** - All temporary vacancies of the faculty were filled. Recruitments to the permanent vacancies were delayed due to the current government policies. The students counselling and students mentoring programmes of the faculty were continued successfully. 12 meetings to consider students request were conducted while a faculty appointed Student Grievance Committee separately considered student's grievances.

## Faculty of Management and Finance

### Dean's Statement

The Faculty of Management and Finance came into existence on 29th April 2003 at the main premises of the University of Ruhuna. The Bachelor of Business Administration honours degree programs at the Faculty of Management and Finance aimed at producing graduates of high caliber, who can cater to the emerging needs in the business management profession both locally and internationally. The faculty has six Departments of studies: namely, Department of Accounting, Department of Business Management, Department of Finance, Department of Human Resource Management, Department of Management and Entrepreneurship, and Department of Marketing. In addition to these departments, the faculty also has a Computer Unit with state of art technology. The BBA Degree in Business Law is a new degree program which will be commenced from the year 2023. Accordingly, the faculty offers BBA honours degrees in six specialization areas (i.e., BBA Hons in Accountancy; BBA Hons in Business Management; BBA Hons in Entrepreneurship; BBA Hons in Finance; BBA Hons in Human Resource Management and BBA Hons in Marketing). All the degree programs at the faculty are four-year honours degree program placed at SLQF level 6 and conducted only in English medium.

By following these programs, the students will learn major concepts, theories, and techniques relevant to six specialization areas (together with other important skills such as communication skills, analytical skills, and problem-solving skills required to understand and manage the factors shaping the modern business administration sphere. Further, the compulsory independent research project promotes life-long learning skills and competencies in building defensible arguments, while the internship training exposes students to the industry, giving an experience of how knowledge, skills, and attitudes they have acquired are applied in a corporate environment.

Other than the undergraduate programs, the faculty coordinates Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) and PhD degree programs based on independent research. Postgraduate Diploma in Business Administration (PDBA), Master of Business Administration (MBA) and Master of Business Management (MBM) programs are special degree programs offered by the faculty, which are mainly based on coursework and a research component.

The faculty reviews its strategic plan on a regular basis and endeavor is made to achieve the Goals specified at the University Corporate Plan. Following Tables provide the details of the achievements of the year 2022.

## Faculty of Science

### Dean's Statement

The Faculty consists of six departments in the subject areas of Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology. Faculty of Science had been offering general and special degree programmes in Physical Science, Biological Science and Computer Science. The 2nd group of students for the new Bachelor of Science (Honours) Degree program in Financial Mathematics and Industrial Statistics was enrolled and commenced academic activities in 2021 from among the students who faced the GCE(A/L) examination in 2020. The Faculty enrolled the increased the student intake for both Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Computer Science. The following table illustrates the summary of the increased number of students enrolled from the batch of students who faced GCE (A/L) examinations in 2020.

Proposed academic carder positions were suspended due to the crisis of the country. No non-academic cadre positions of

temporary demonstrator / temporary instructor positions were received relevant to increased intake. Faculty was able to processed only approximately 17 million out of the allocated Rs. 133 million for purchasing the equipment and furniture for catering additional intake of students and recalled the rest of the procurements again. Faculty had been progressing well with the implementation of the activities relevant to the seven various grants received under the AHEAD project as the faculty as well as individual departments that submitted applications jointly with academic staff of the within and outside the faculty. The faculty is presently in the process of the proposals the proposal for the BSc Honours degree programme.

## Faculty of Technology

### Dean's Statement

The year 2022 was a remarkable year in the Development of FOT. Following almost two years of Covid Pandemic, the academic programme started physically for all the levels. The academic activities of Final year students were expedited, and the First batch was graduated in 2021 and the second batch of students were graduated in 2022. The lecture Hall building complex with a 500-seating capacity auditorium were declared opened in February 2022. An Examination Hall established with 300 new examination tables and chairs in the new Lecture Hall building Complex. A student canteen designed in modern architecture was constructed. The canteen was declared open in July 2022. The computer pool was developed with 50 new computers. A network expansion project was developed and obtained the approval to conduct under the additional intake budget. This project includes expanding the Wi-Fi facilities to Hostels, Lecture Halls and other student common areas and installing IP based security camera inside the Faculty premises. With all the above infrastructure development the faculty was ready for the increased student intake.

The main research conference and awarding ceremony of University of Ruhuna, "The 19<sup>th</sup> Academic Session and the 18<sup>th</sup> Vice Chancellor's Award Ceremony" was hosted by the Faculty of Technology in year 2022. As the Dean of the Faculty, this responsibility was undertaken to improve the research culture in the faculty among the majority of junior lecturers in the faculty. We were able to conduct the above university level event successfully on 2<sup>nd</sup> March 2022. The condemned vehicles was obtained to FOT

for developing students skills. Some of the vehicles could be taken to the working condition and currently using in the using for the faculty needs. The industrial partnership developed with the SL mobility (Pvt) Ltd in developing Electric Vehicles is a remarkable achievement in the research development of the faculty. A MOU signed with the company and start projects converting three wheelers, boats and bike to Electric vehicles. A condemned three-wheeler of the University was successfully converted to an Electric three wheeler.

During the later half of the year, as the Dean I was focused on developing students disciplines and recreational activities with support of student councilors of the faculty. A remarkable improvement in official communication with student was obtained in organizing events, following procedures, obtaining permissions, accountability and taking responsibilities. An official communication path established by giving official email account through the faculty were popularized and were able to utilize well in improving the communication. Currently, students are living freely in the Faculty of Technology enjoying the time as responsible University Students without engaging any activities disrupting the academic program and disturbing the peace

### ➤ Statement of the Director

Career Guidance Unit helps undergraduates to develop their skills and abilities of self-assessment information seeking and decision making required for coping with the needs of complex world of work & to develop lifelong learning ambitions. University of Ruhuna established the Career Guidance Unit in March 2000 to provide innovative and inclusive support to University of Ruhuna students, supporting their transition from study to future opportunities. We are planning to develop and maintain partnerships with a wide variety of employers and industry professionals to get the inside knowledge and to provide greater development opportunities. Success in career guidance depends on providing up to date information on training & employment opportunities and having a good knowledge of available opportunities in the local and international training market. For that, we plan to run interactive events and training sessions, enabling us to provide an inclusive, comprehensive and accessible careers and employability support. Beginning from the University Studentship at the University of Ruhuna, the Career Guidance Unit (CGU) helps to chart the path towards the first destination upon graduation. In this endeavor, the career guidance unit is to assist the undergraduates in acquiring attributes and soft skills which can assist them in reaching standards matching the potential employer's requirements. To this end, CGU usually conducts a number of programs on various aspects of career aimed at increasing the soft skills aspects in e.g. Personality development, qualities of leadership, communication and presentation skills etc., and in pragmatic training of e.g. writing an effective CV, facing interviews etc., to help in building self-confidence and in preparation to undertake progressive steps towards entering the corporate sector. 

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

## For the Year Ended December 31, 2022

### 1. General Information

#### 1.1 Legal and Domicile Form

University of Ruhuna is a Government University which was established under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and domiciled in Sri Lanka. At present university has 10 Faculties. The Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences, Sciences, Management & Finance, Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technologies and main premises at Wellamadama, Matara. The Faculties of Medicine, Engineering and Allied Health Sciences are situated at Karapitiya, Hapugala, Uluvitike in Galle district respectively. The Faculties of Agriculture and Technology are located in Kamburupitya, Matara. During the year Faculty of graduate studies moved to renovated building complex at Matara Fort .

#### 1.2 Principal Activities & Nature of Operation

The university primarily caters to local students to promote and develop Higher Education and Research in the fields of Agriculture, Humanities & Social Sciences, Medicine, Science, Allied Health Sciences , Management & Finance, Engineering, Fisheries and Marine Sciences and Technology .

#### 1.3 Financial Period

The Financial period of the University of Ruhuna represent twelve months period from 01<sup>st</sup> January 2022 to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022.

#### 1.4 Date of Authorization for Issue

The Financial statement for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> , December 2022 of the university of Ruhuna was approved and authorized to issue by the 432<sup>th</sup> meeting of the University Council held on 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2023.

#### 1.5 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

##### 1.5.1 Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of the University of Ruhuna have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSASs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka.

The financial statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Funds & Reserves , Cash Flow Statement and Notes to the Financial Statements. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures. The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of the ,financial statements are set out below.

### **1.5.2 Basis of Measurement**

The Financial Statements have been prepared on historical cost basis except where appropriate disclosures are made with regard to the fair value clarified by relevant notes.

### **1.5.3 Comparative Information**

Comparative information including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information is disclosed in respect of the previous period for all amounts reported in the financial statements in order to enhance the understanding of the financial statements of the current period and to improve comparability. When necessary, comparative figures have been rearranged to conform to the current year presentation.

### **1.5.4 Functional and Presentation Currency**

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the functional and presentation currency of the University. All financial information presented in Sri Lankan Rupees has been rounded to the nearest rupee.

### **1.5.5 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgments**

The preparation and presentation of financial statements in conformity with SLPSASs, requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates and judgments used.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to

accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods. Any changes in accounting estimates and critical judgments are disclosed in the relevant notes to the financial statements.

### **1.5.6 Going Concern**

Financial statements have been prepared on the assumption that the University is a going concern basis.

## **2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

### **2.1. Assets and the basis of their valuation**

#### **2.1.1 Property, Plant and Equipment.**

##### **(a) Recognition and Measurement**

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized when, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the asset will flow to the University and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably.

All items of Property, Plant and Equipment are initially recognized at cost. After initial recognition subsequent measurement of Property, Plant & Equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation except classes of Land, Motor Vehicle & buildings.

Land, Motor Vehicle & buildings are subsequently measured at revaluation modal and carried at a revalued amount, being its fair value at the date of the revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Assets acquired through the non exchange transactions recognized at its fair value as at the date of acquisition. Property, Plant and Equipment include the assets acquired through the government grants, Projects, research grants, internally generated funds and donations. The value of property plant & equipment received as gift and, donations were recognized as revenue from Non exchange transaction in accordance with the SLPSAS 11 . Repair and maintenance cost are recognized in the statement of financial performance as incurred.

Rs.21.00 Mn has been paid to the Divisional Secretary , Bope Poddala for the acquisition of land called “Piyon Arachchige Watta” adjacent to the Department of Electrical & Information Engineering , Faculty of Engineering to construct a building to admin the new student intake. The possession of the said land was transferred to the University on 08<sup>th</sup> April 2021 . The said land has been capitalized and included under the Statement of Financial Position.

Three acre land called “Keselgashena Watta” has been transferred for the consideration of 13.28 Mn from the Land Reform Commission for the Faculty of Medicine playground. Land Reform Commission has given their concurrence for the payment of consideration in 60 equal installment. Payable balance as at 31.12.2022 was Rs.4.64 Mn, which is included in the Statement of Financial Position. The purchase consideration and other initial expenditures incurred for this land have been

capitalized and included under the Statement of Financial Position.

The University has rented , University buildings and premises to the BOC bank and peoples bank at a agreed rental . As these Properties are not held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation (or both) , Not classified under Investment property and recognized as a Property Plant and Equipment in the Statement of Financial position .

Major Renovation works in the Existing Building at Main Premises , Bachelor quarters building and Second Stage of Building Complex for Faculty of Management and Finance have been completed in the current financial year . Total cost of the contracts were capitalized and recognized in the Statement of Financial position. Further Construction works of Three Storied Lecture Hall Building, Faculty of Technology, University of Ruhuna (Including Furniture) which funded by the AHEAD project of world bank was completed during the financial year . Total cost of the Grant was Rs.392 Mn .

New Sports complex including badminton and volleyball court project was completed during the year . Total cost of the project was Rs.10.8 Mn and Rs.10 Mn has been granted by the Hon.President for the Sports development of the University of Ruhuna in the year 2021 .

Further , New complex of the Faculty of Graduate Studies of University of Ruhuna was established in the old renovated building at the Matara Fort owned by University of

Ruhuna . Total estimated cost of the renovation contract is Rs.83.28Mn.

However as final bill of the contract , have not been settled yet , cost of the renovated building couldn't be measured reliably and not recognized in the financial statement under Property plant & equipment .

#### **(b) Subsequent Expenditure**

Subsequent expenditure incurred for the purpose of acquiring, extending or improving assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the earning capacity of the assets has been treated as capital expenditure. Expenditure incurred to replace a component of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment that is accounted for separately, including major inspection and overhaul expenditure, is capitalized. Other subsequent expenditure is capitalized only if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the University and its cost can be measured reliably.

#### **(c) Revaluation of Property Plant & Equipment**

Land and Buildings have been revalued by a professionally qualified person in year 2006. Lands which were not accounted at the time of revaluation have been valued and accounted using at rates prevailed at the time of acquisition of lands.

The class of motor vehicle has been revalued during the year 2020 and 2022 by the member of profession in government valuation department. Revaluation surplus arising from the revalued vehicles has been transferred to

revaluation reserve and included in the accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial performance.

#### **(d) Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight –Line basis over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use . Lands are not depreciated.

Depreciation of an assets begin from the month when it is available for use and ceases at the month that the asset is de-recognized or fully depreciated. Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment purchased through project , research grant and restricted funds are charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

The cost of fully depreciated assets which are recognized based on the cost model as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS ) 07 , as of 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 amounted Rs.2,105 Mn .

Further following three vehicle which fully depreciated were not in a running condition and the repairs being uneconomical . As such these vehicle were retired from active use and held for disposal .

#### (e) De recognition

An item of Property, Plant and Equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de recognition of the asset except motor vehicle is calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount and included in the Statement of Financial Performance in the year, the asset is derecognized.

#### 2.1.2 Finance Lease

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. During the year 2020, Financial lease obligations for the Lease of Ashok Leyland bus (NC-4780) & Toyota Camry car (CAP-7905 ) fully settled and ownership of the

leased assets were transferred to the University . At the year end date there were no any capital obligations arising from lease arrangements.

#### 2.1.3 Work- in- Progress & Rehabilitation

Capital work-in-progress & rehabilitation is stated at cost. These are expenses of a capital nature directly incurred in the construction & improvement of Property, Plant and Equipment which are awaiting for the capitalization. Capital work-in-progress & rehabilitation expenditure are transferred to the relevant asset category in Property Plant and Equipment, when the full cost is reliably measured and when the asset is available for use. Capital expenses incurred during the year which are not satisfied the recognition criteria as at the date of the Statement of Financial Position are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress and Rehabilitation.

#### 2.1.4 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recognized when it is probable that future economic benefits or service potential that are attributable to the asset will flow to the university and the cost of the intangible asset can be measured reliably.

All intangible assets acquired separately are initially measured at cost. Subsequently it will be carried at its cost less any accumulated amortization under cost model in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 20 ( SLPSAS ). The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange.

All intangible assets with finite useful lives are amortized on straight line basis over its estimated useful life and charged to the statement of Financial performance as follows

**(a) Computer software**

Acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful life of five (5) years on straight line basis .

**(b) Human Capital development & Quality Assurance expenses**

As University has insufficient control over the expected future economic benefits arising from human capital development and quality assurance cost for these items to meet the definition of an intangible asset. All the capital nature expenditure incurred for the human capital development and quality assurance is recognized as an expense when incurred and charged to Statement of Financial Performance.

**(c) Internally Generated intangible assets Research Expenses**

As per the SLPSA 20 , No intangible assets arising from research phase shall be recognized and Expenditure on research shall be recognized as an expenses when it is incurred . Accordingly all the expenditure incurred for the research expenses recognized as an expenses and charged to the statement of financial performance.

**(d) Development Expenses**

All internally developed intangible assets are recognized only if the recondition criteria are met in accordance with the SLPSAS 20 section 55 .

**2.1.5 Investments**

Investment in Fixed deposits & Saving relating are stated at cost and interest accrued on short term investment is accounted as a receivable in the financial statement and Interest income relating to the restricted funds such as endowment funds , designated funds and projects are recognized on the realization and credited to the relevant restricted fund account and included in statement of financial position .

**2.2 Inventories**

**2.2.1 Inventories (Stocks )**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value after making due adjustment for obsolete items and the cost was determined based on First In First Out (FIFO) method. The cost includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing location and condition. The inventories of the university include stationery items , consumables , maintenance stocks and medical stocks .

**2.2.2 Live Stock**

Live Stock consists living animals held for the agricultural activity managed by the Farm of Faculty of Agriculture. Live stock are measured on initial recognition and each reporting date at its fair value less cost to sell. The fair value of the livestock was determined

based on the published rates of National Livestock Development board (NLBD ) and prevailing market prices of the similar assets. A gain or loss arising on recognition of Live stock at its fair value and changes in fair value are included in surplus or deficit for the period in which it arises as per the provision of SLPSAS 18.

### 2.2.3 Yield Stock

Yield stock consist harvested product of the Agriculture farm . Valuation of Yield stock was based on the market price at the date of verification.

## 2.3 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand , cash in current account ,call deposits and bank borrowings that are payable on demand . However, restricted cash deposits such as scholarship and gold medal deposits are not recognized as a part of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of preparation of cash flow statement.

## 2.4 Liabilities & Provisions

### 2.4.1 Liabilities

All known liabilities as at the date of statement of financial position are included in the financial statements and obligations payable on demand or within one year of the date of statement of financial position are treated as current liabilities in the statement of financial position. Liabilities payable after one year from the date of statement of financial position are treated as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

### 2.4.2 Provisions

A provision is recognized in the Statement of Financial Position, when the University has an obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of assets will be required to settle the obligation and the obligation can be measured reliably.

### 2.4.3 Capital Commitments and Contingencies

Contingencies are possible assets or obligation that arise from past event and would be confirmed only on the occurrence or non-occurrence of uncertain future events, which are beyond the Universities control. University does not recognize contingent liabilities and capital commitments, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow or inflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

Following litigations cases were continued as at the financial position date and no

provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities or assets arising out of litigation activities.

#### 2.4.4 Defined Benefit Plan - Retiring Gratuity

Defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan, other than a defined contribution plan . Accordingly Provision for gratuity was made in accordance with Gratuity Act No.12 of 1983. The gratuity liability is not externally funded and not actuarially valued. As per the University Grant Commission Circular No.05/0219 dated on 04<sup>th</sup> June 2019 , Academic allowance and MCA ( Monthly Compensatory Allowance ) paid for the staff are considered for the Gratuity calculation in terms of the Gratuity Act no.12 of 1983 with effect from 01<sup>st</sup> June 2019.

#### 2.4.5 Defined Contribution Plan – University Provident Fund , Employees’ Trust Fund and Pension scheme.

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment plan under which an entity pays fixed contribution into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay a further amount. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the statement of financial performance as and when they are due.

Employees are eligible for ‘University Provident Fund Contributions, Employees

Trust Fund Contributions and University Pension Fund in line with respective statutes and regulations. These are recognized as an expense in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred. The university contributes 8% , 3% and 7% of gross emoluments of the employees to University 'Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund and University pension fund respectively.

### **2.5 Restricted Funds and Grants**

Where the grants/donations are received for use in an identified project or activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and , unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund and reserves in the Statement of Financial Position until such time as they are required. Where expenditure of such approved grant exceeds the income received and if there is certainty that the balance will be received, such amounts are recognized as receivables in the Statement of Financial Position.

### **2.8 Accelerating Higher Education Expansion And Development (AHEAD) Grant**

Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) is a World Bank funded project for Sri Lankan government to support the higher education sector with the objectives of expanding enrolment in priority disciplines, improve the quality of degree programs, and promote research and innovation in the higher education sector .Ministry of Education is the implementing agency of this project . University Grant Commission and Operations Monitoring and Support Team (OMST) are coordinate and support for the project activities of the universities.

Since the above project is operated separately through Operational Technical Secretariat office (OTS ) of the University of Ruhuna , Grant receipt and expenses of the AHEAD operations have

### **2.6 Designated Funds**

Any fund designated by the University for a specific purpose with the approval of the Council are identified as a Designated Funds. Unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund and reserves in the Statement of Financial Position until such time as they are required.

### **2.7 Endowment Funds**

Where assets are received as an endowment, only the income earned from such assets may be recognized and used as income. Investment income and other gains realized from such endowment investments are allocated to the appropriate funds, unless the relevant agreement or minute provides otherwise.

Endowment funds such as gold medal and scholarships held under the deposits were reclassified and presented under the Endowment funds in the Statement of Financial Position under accumulated funds and reserves .

not been included in the financial statement . However capital assets acquired through this grant including Property Plant & Equipment, completed construction works and human capital development expenditure are recognized as revenue from non-exchange transaction in accordance with SLPSAS 11 in the Statement of Financial Performance and accumulated under capital surplus/ (deficit) in the Statement of Financial Position. .

## 2.9 Revenue Recognition

Revenue comprises gross inflows of economic benefits or service potential received and receivable by University during the year and represents an increase in net assets/equity. University recognizes revenue following the established criteria of SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions).

### 2.9.1 Revenue from Exchange transaction

#### (a) Undergraduate & other internal income

All the income derived from the undergraduate degree programmes and other internal income are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the cash basis.

#### (b) Income generated from self-financing activities

Self-financing activities ranging from consultancy, postgraduate taught courses, external degree programmes, testing are conducting on cost recovery and non – profit basis. The income, expenditure and contribution for development votes of self financing activities have been disclosed under note 26 of the Statement of Financial Performance.

Income of the self financing activities recognized to the extent of the expenditure incurred for the period and future

expenditures and contribution to the development votes are shown under the deferred income in the statement of financial position.

#### (c) Interest Income

Interest income received for the period is recorded as exchange revenue in the Statement of Financial Performance except for the investment income earned from the externally restricted funds , designated funds and endowments funds . When the investment income earned from those funds are in excess over the expenditure, the excess is recorded as a direct increase in relevant fund and included in the Statement of Financial Position under accumulated reserves and grants.

Interest on investment of gold medal and scholarship funds are accounted on cash basis if not matured during the accounting period.

#### (d) Rent Income

Rental income arising from renting out university assets is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the rental terms and included in revenue.

#### (e) Income from Agriculture Farm

Income and expenditure related to the Mapalana Agriculture farm is separately recognized in the financial statement under note 27 .



### 2.9.2 Revenue from Non - Exchange transactions.

Non-exchange transactions are those where the university receives value from another entity (e.g. cash or other assets) without giving approximately equal value in exchange.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions, other than services in-kind, that meet the definition of an asset are recognized as an asset only when:

- It is probable that the University will receive an inflow of economic benefits or service potential ; and
- The fair value of can be measured reliably.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognized as assets are recognized as non- exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognized in respect to the same inflow.

The following are the specific recognition criterias in relation to the University non-exchange transactions.

#### (a) Government Grant / Transfers

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are recognized in the period in which the transfer arrangement becomes binding at the fair value . Where a transfer is subject to conditions and when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transaction, University recognizes a liability until the conditions is fulfilled.

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are measured at the fair value as at the

date of recognition. Monetary assets are measured at their nominal value.

#### (b) Recurrent Grant

Government grants received for the recurrent nature expenditures are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance under non exchange transactions.

The government grants of Rs. 4,430 Mn was received as recurrent grant for the year 2022.

#### (c) Capital Block Grant and other Transfers

Government Grants and other capital transfers received for the capital expenditure are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance in accordance with the requirement of SLPSAS 11 , Revenue from non - exchange transactions with effect from the financial year 2020 . Capital surplus / (deficit) arising from the capital transactions are accumulated under the Accumulated Fund – Capital in the Statement of Financial Statement.

#### 2.9.3 Reclassification to Accumulated - fund Capital

University adopt and applied SLPSAS 11 – Revenue from Non Exchange transaction standard with effect from the year 2020 prospectively.

To harmonize the presentation of financial statements , comparative figures in relation to spent capital grant , capital grant unspent , gift and donations were reclassified in to “Accumulated surplus capital “ in the statement of financial position accordance with the SLPSAS 11 and guidance issued by the APFASL .

#### 2.9.4 Gifts, Donations and Goods in kind received

Gifts, donations are voluntary transfers of assets including cash or other monetary assets and goods in-kind that the University receives which are free from stipulations.

Gifts and donations and goods in kind received are recognized as non-exchange revenue at its fair value when it is probable that the future economic benefits or service potential will flow to the University, and the

fair value of the assets can be measured reliably.

During the year 2022 , Sri Lanka Invention commission has donated 19.20 Mn worth of assets for the implementation of Southern Technology Incubation Center for the University of Ruhuna and fair value recognized under Revenue from Non exchange transaction in the Statement of Financial Performance. In addition to that following gift and donations were received during the year.

In addition , During the year University premises roads were tarred and repaired by the Road development Authority . The project was done by RDA using their resources , as such cost of the Project was not recognized in the Financial Statement of the University of Ruhuna .

#### 2.10 Expenditure recognition.

The expenditure has been analyzed by Program/project/object wise and analysis was classified under different expenditure headings based on UGC guidelines to comply with the Common Reporting Format during the period of which they are incurred. All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been recognized on accrual

basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

During the year ,Mahapola Scholarship amounting Rs.99.58 has been directly paid undergraduate student by the Mahapola Trust fund board and University grant Commission . As the University does not directly involved in this transaction , The value of Mahapola Scholarship paid to Undergraduate Student of the University of Ruhuna has not been presented in the statement of Financial performance for the year end 31st December 2022 .

### **2.11 Statement of Cash Flows**

The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared in accordance with SLPSAS 02 Cash Flow Statement under the indirect method.

### **2.12 Events after the reporting period**

The materiality of events occurring after the reporting period has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the accounts

### **2.13 Foreign Currency Transaction**

Transaction currencies other than Sri Lankan Rupees are converted in to Sri Lankan Rupees at rates which approximate the actual rates at the transaction date.

### **2.14 Inter division's transaction**

Financial statement has been prepared by eliminating the Interdivision transactions and outstanding balances. Following interdivision balances are eliminated, Rs.8 Mn receivable balance from the Faculty of Graduate studies

and payable amounts were eliminated in the Statement of Financial Performance.

### **2.15 Related Party Transactions**

The key management personal of the University are the members of the University Council & the members of the senior management personal. The University Council is the executive body and governing authority of the University which consist of the Vice-Chancellor, Deputy Vice-Chancellor, the Deans of the faculties, two members elected by the Senate and the external members appointed by the University Grant Commission.

There is no any contracts entered between the university and any member of the key management personal who is having direct or indirect interest and there is no any Related-party transactions, including sales, purchases, loans, transfers, leasing arrangements , guarantees , amount receivable from or payable to related parties other than the employee remuneration and allowances for services provided during the period.

### **2.16 Comparison of Budget and Actual Amounts**

Budget and accounting basis is differ. Budgets to the university is approved cash basis annually. Although University financial statement covers all the financial activities of the university, budgets are approved only for the government grant. The Statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts compares the final budget to actual amounts calculated on the same basis as the corresponding budgetary amounts

# 1. Auditor General's Report

**The report of the Auditor General in terms of section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 on the financial statements of the University of Ruhuna for the year ended 31 December 2022 and for other legal and regulatory requirements**

## 1. Financial Statements

### 1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of financial statements of the University of Ruhuna for the year ended 31 December 2022 comprising the statement of Financial Position as at 31 December 2022 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended and the summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with the provisions of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 and Subsection 107(5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. This report sets out my comments and observations which in my opinion should be published with the annual reports of the University in terms of Subsection 108(1) of the Universities Act. My report will be tabled in the Parliament in due course, in terms of sub section 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the section on qualified opinion in my report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Ruhuna as at 31 December 2022 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

### 1.2 Basis for Qualified Opinion

- (a) Although the fair value of the items of property, plant and equipment should be revalued once every 03 or 05 years according to Paragraph 47 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 7, 28 blocks of land owned by the University had not been revalued since 2006.
- (b) According to Paragraph 49 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 7, the entire class of assets should be revalued in the revaluation of property, plant and equipment. However, out of 51 vehicles owned by the University, only 31 had been revalued during the year under review. Similarly, due to the failure to account for the revaluation amount of 24 vehicles, the value of both the vehicles and the revaluation reserve were understated by Rs.27,776,400.
- (c) The expenditure of Rs. 2,064,387 incurred for accessing the software during the year under review had been brought to account under the intangible assets instead of being identified as a revenue expenditure. Consequently, the expenditure for the year had been understated, while the value of intangible assets had been overstated by the same amount in the financial statements.

- (d) Fixed assets worth Rs. 4,123,108 received as the donations during the preceding year had been adjusted as capital revenue from non-exchange transactions of the year under review instead of retrospectively adjusting them. As a result, the capital surplus for the year had been overstated by that amount in the financial statements.
- (e) A sum of Rs. 3,964,256 that remained receivable from a lecturer due to the violation of agreements had been written off from the financial statements during the year under review without obtaining proper approval.
- (f) Although the balance of the deferred course fee income was Rs. 207,555,076 according to the statement of financial position as at 31 December of the year under review, it was Rs. 197,886,816 as per the related schedule, thus resulting in a difference of Rs. 9,668,259.
- (g) The details of the debit balance relevant to Rs. 1,857,250 stated under sundry deposits since the year 2012 were not submitted to the audit.

I carried out the audit in compliance with the Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAS). My responsibility under these standards has been further described in the section entitled 'Auditor's responsibility in auditing the financial statements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

### **1.3 Other information contained in the Annual Report 2022 of the University**

Other information means information, though included in the Annual Report 2022 of the University which is expected to be handed over to me after the date of this audit but not included in the financial statements and in my audit report thereon. Those charged with management shall be responsible for other information.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover other information and I do not provide an assurance of any manner or express an opinion on it.

My responsibility in relation to my audit on financial statements is to read other information whenever available and to consider whether there are material inconsistencies between the financial statements or my knowledge gained otherwise and other information in doing so.

In reading the annual report 2022 of the University, if I concluded that there are material misstatements, such matters shall be communicated to those charged with management. If there still are misstatements which have not been corrected, they will be included in the report to be tabled in Parliament by me in due course in terms of Article 154(6) of the Constitution.

### **1.4 Responsibility of the Management for Financial Statements and governing partners**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing financial statements, it is the responsibility of the management to decide the sustainability of the University as a going concern and it is also the responsibility of the management to keep accounts on the basis of going concern and disclose matters relevant to the

University as a going concern unless the management intends to liquidate the university or takes action to suspend its operations in the absence of any other alternative.

The responsibility concerning the financial reporting process of the University is borne by the governing parties.

In terms of Sub Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University shall maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared in respect of the University.

### **1.5 Auditor's responsibility regarding financial statements**

My objective is to give reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement whether due to fraud or error and to issue auditor's report that includes my opinion. The reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted with in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

I have conducted the audit in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards maintaining professional judgment and professional scepticism. The auditor also,

- Identifies and assesses risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, designs and performs audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtains audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for the auditor's opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtains an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluates the appropriateness of the accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Concludes on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my audit report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern.

- Evaluates the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I have communicated with those charged with governance regarding, the significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I have identified during the audit.

## **2. Report on other legal and regulatory requirements**

- 2.1 Special provisions are included in respect of the following requirements in the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.1.1 In terms of the requirements of section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, other than the effects of the matters described in the section on qualified opinion, I obtained all information and explanations required for the audit and as far as it appears from my inspection, the University had maintained proper financial reports.
- 2.1.2 In terms of the requirement indicated in Section 6(1)(d) (iii) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2008, the financial statements presented by the university are consistent with the preceding year.
- 2.1.3 In terms of the requirement of Section 6(1)(d) (iv) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2008, the recommendations made by me in the previous year have been included in the financial statements.
- 2.2 On the basis of the procedures followed and evidence obtained and being restricted within the material matters, nothing that warrants the making of the following statements did not come to my attention.
- 2.2.1 In terms of the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, whether any member of the governing body of the Ruhuna University has any interest, direct or otherwise, outside normal business status in any contract entered into by the University.
- 2.2.2 In terms of the requirement of Section 12(f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, whether the Ruhuna University has or has not complied with any applicable written law or other general or special directions issued by the governing council of the University, except for the following observations.

### 2.3 Other Matters

- (a) The University had failed to recover sums totaling Rs. 157,953,261 remained receivable from 30 lecturers due to the violation of bonds during the years 2006, 2008 and 2018 even by 31 December 2022.
- (b) Although rents for the official quarters had been increased since the year 2020 in accordance with the Council decision made at its 413th meeting held on 17 June 2021, the increased rental was not recovered from the quarters at the Wellamadama premises for 22 months from January 2020 to October 2021, resulting in an outstanding rental of Rs. 3,589,800 due from the official quarters as at 31 December 2022.
- (c) No action had been taken to recover the loan balances totaling Rs. 1,295,498 due from 19 lecturers, officers and employees who had retired or vacated the service.
- (d) Since the relevant location had not been inspected in the first call for bids on 31 March 2021 for the purchase of furniture and fittings for the senate meeting hall of the Faculty of Management and Finance, those bids were rejected by the Bid Evaluation Committee. Although the bidder who submitted the lowest bid at the first call for bids had also offered the lowest bid in the second call for bids on 31 August 2021, the University had to make an overpayment of Rs. 1,166,720 when comparing the bids presented in the first and second call for bids.
- (e) Twelve computers and accessories worth Rs. 1,229,925 purchased by the funds from the AHEAD Project and the university funds in the years 2019, 2020 and 2021 for the Engineering Faculty remained idle without being utilized.
- (f) In the purchase of 280 (i5) desk top computers at a cost of Rs. 31,474,800 for the Engineering Faculty in December 2021, the supplier had delayed the supply without being extended the contracted period and out of the late fee recovered from the supplier 50 per cent or Rs. 1,748,600 had been repaid to the supplier during the year under review without a formal approval.
- (g) As at 31 December 2022, a sum of Rs. 2,936,263 was due from the SLT Mobitel for the communication towers constructed on the University premises without entering into an agreement.
