# UNIVERSITY OF RUHUNA



## EMBLEM

The Emblem of the University of Ruhuna depicts the island of Sri Lanka being illuminated by the flame of a simple traditional earthenware lamp. The flame rises from near the centre of the southern coast (where the main campus is located) and its effulgence represented in short, straight, radiating lines, appears to light the entire island. These are circumscribed by two concentric ovals with their vertical sides, exterior to which on the upper half runs the Pali motto "*paññā naranam ratanam*" (Wisdom to mankind is a treasure), and on the lower half the name of the university in Sinhala "*ruhuna vishva vidyalaya*" (University of Ruhuna). Another similar oval, but in bolder line, runs round the lettering enclosing the entire design.

## 1.1 BRIEF HISTORY

In October 1977, the Government of Sri Lanka appointed a committee headed by Prof. M. B. Ariyapala to do a feasibility study on the establishment of a university in the Southern Province.

In January 1978, the committee recommended the City of Matara, the Commercial Capital of the Southern Province of Sri Lanka, as the most suitable location for this purpose.

The enactment of the Universities Act No. 46 of 1978 enabled the University Grants Commission to establish the Ruhuna University College, fulfilling a long cherished desire and need of the people in Southern Sri Lanka.

As a result, on August 27<sup>th</sup>, 1978, the then Prime Minister of Sri Lanka Hon J.R. Jayawardene declared open the Ruhuna University College at Meddawatta, Matara, with Prof. Mervyn W. Thenabadu as its Director.

The fledgling institution at Matara was elevated and renamed as the Ruhuna University College on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 1979.

The university college commenced its academic activities with three faculties: Humanities and Social Sciences, Agriculture and Sciences. The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences was located at the Teachers' Training College at Eliyakanda, and the Science and Agriculture Faculties were located in the Junior Technical College premises at Meddewatta, Matara.

The medical students admitted to that academic year were sent to the Faculties of Medicine of the Universities of Colombo and Peradeniya for their pre-clinical courses in their first and second years of study.

The premises where the university college was located were found inadequate to meet the needs of the new university and a new location was selected for the main campus at Wellamadama, two kilometers from Matara facing Matara-Kataragama main road.

Under the guidance of the world-renowned architect Geoffrey Bawa, the Edward Reed & Beg Company designed the buildings and the Ballast Nedam Company of the Netherlands completed the construction at all three sites: Wellamadama, Mapalana, and Karapitiya.

The General Administration Offices, the Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences and Science were shifted to the Wellamadama Campus in 1985.

The Wellamadama Campus covers an area of about 72 acres with the buildings of the Faculties of Science and Humanities and Social Sciences, Vice Chancellor's Residence, Guest House and Bachelor Quarters, a Gymnasium, an Outreach Centre, Two Auditoriums, Lecture Theatres, an Administration Block, two Hostels etc.

While the University of Peradeniya was the first University in Sri Lanka constructed on a sound ecologically friendly plan, the University of Ruhuna became the second and the only university, which was constructed on a sound architectural plan utilizing funds from the Government of Sri Lanka. In the late 1970s the total construction cost was LKR 917.6 million.

At the inception, the Faculty of Science functioned with only five departments: Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics and Zoology while the Faculty of Humanities & Social Sciences with four departments: Sinhala, History, Economics and Geography.

The Ruhuna University College was upgraded to a fully-fledged university on 1<sup>st</sup> February 1984 by an order made by the Minister of Education under section 21 and 21(1) of the Universities Act. No. 16 of 1978 published in the Gazette extraordinary dated 24<sup>th</sup> *January* 1984 in terms of section 27(2) of the Act.

His Excellency the President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka J.R. Jayawardene appointed Professor G.P. Samarawickrema as the Vice Chancellor with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> February 1984 under section 144 (a) of the Universities Act.

Until the Ruhuna University College was upgraded to a university, the Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences and Medicine were affiliated to the University of Colombo while the Faculties of Science and Agriculture were affiliated to the Universities of Kelaniya and Peradeniya respectively. Ending this situation, Dr. Amaradasa Weerasinghe became the founder Dean of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences in 1984.

On 28<sup>th</sup> January 2000, Her Excellency the President Chandrika Bandaranayeka Kumaranatunga inaugurated the Faculty of Engineering, which was constructed at a cost of Rs. 600 million at Hapugala, Galle.

In 2003, the Faculty of Management and Finance was established initially with two departments. Before that the study programmes in Business Administration had been offered by the Department of Business Administration that used to exist within the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. Now, it functions with there major departments which cover the wide range of subjects.

In order to develop distance education programmes, the university was able to establish an External Examinations Division in 1997 at Bibulawela, Kamburupitiya and the same year it was shifted to Wellamadama.

For the purpose of centralizing and promoting postgraduate studies in all faculties, an independent body was established in June 2003 with Prof. Morley De Silva as Director.

The University of Ruhuna is now a fully fledged university. It is making a significant contribution to national and regional development of the country. The members of its academic staff serve as consultants and advisors to a wide spectrum of national bodies and professional associations.

In terms of its future prospects, the university is now in the process of developing and upgrading short-term and long-term programmes of teaching and research.

Together with the introduction of the semester system and course unit system based on course credits, the recent curricular revisions that address the national needs in the respective disciplines have put the university on a par with many prestigious universities within Sri Lanka and abroad.

The effort proves that the University of Ruhuna is deeply committed to developing quality academic programmes in the best interest of the human resource development of Sri Lanka.

## **1.2 ORGANIZATION**

The University of Ruhuna operates under the provisions of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and the Universities (Amendment) Act No. 7 of 1985. Accordingly, the university has a Chancellor, a Vice Chancellor, Officers and Authorities to draw plans, make decisions, and monitor the implementation of such decisions in the overall management.

### **1.2.1 CHANCELLOR**

The Chancellor, the ceremonial and titular head of the university, presides over at the university convocation. The President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka nominates the Chancellor for a period of five years.

### **1.2.2 VICE CHANCELLOR**

The Vice Chancellor is the Principal Executive Officer, Principal Academic Officer, and Chief Accounting Officer of the University. The President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka appoints the Vice Chancellor out of three nominations made by the University Council for a period of three years. The Vice Chancellor is the Chairman and ex-officio member of both the Council and the Senate of the University and is responsible for the maintenance of discipline.

### **1.2.3 DEPUTY VICE CHANCELLOR**

The Deputy Vice Chancellor is appointed by the UGC on the approval of the Council of the University. The Deputy Vice Chancellor is responsible for student affairs and substitutes for the Vice Chancellor as and when it is necessary.

### **1.2.4 DEANS**

The Faculty Board elects a Dean for each faculty from the Heads of Departments for a period of three years. The Deans are the academic and administrative heads of their respective faculties.

### **1.2.5 REGISTRAR**

The Council of the University appoints the Registrar. The Registrar is the ex-officio secretary of both the Council and the Senate. The Registrar is responsible for the general administration, the conduction of examinations, the publication of results, and the discipline of the non-academic staff. The Registrar functions subject to the direction and control of the Vice Chancellor. The Registrar is also the Assistant Accounting Officer of the University and is responsible for the custody of the records and the property. In this connection, the Deputy Registrar, the Assistant Registrars, and the general administration with its many departments and divisions assist the Registrar.

### **1.2.6 LIBRARIAN**

The Council, subject to the direction and control of the Vice Chancellor, appoints the Librarian and he is responsible for the administration of the libraries of the university. The Librarian is an ex-officio member of the Senate and usually the Chairman of the Library Committee unless the Vice Chancellor himself chairs the committee.

### **1.2.7 BURSAR**

The Bursar, appointed by the Council of the University on following a selection process, is responsible for financial administration and the maintenance of accounts subject to the direction and control of the Registrar. He is also the custodian of the funds of the university, in addition to being responsible for the procurement of supplies and the arrangement of all payments. The preparation of the annual statements of accounts is a key function of the Bursar.

## **1.3 THE AUTHORITIES**

### **1.3.1 THE COUNCIL**

The Council is the chief executive body and governing authority of the University. The Council consists of the Vice Chancellor, the Deputy Vice Chancellor, the Deans of the Faculties, two elected Senate Members, and outside representatives whose number should be greater than the number of members from the University. A Council Member serves for a period of three years and is eligible for reappointment.

### **1.3.2 THE SENATE**

The Senate chaired by the Vice Chancellor is the academic authority of the University. The Senate consists of the following person:

## **2. FACULTY OF HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES**

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences is located on the Main Campus of the University of Ruhuna which is situated on a cliff surrounded by a watercourse by the side of the Matara-Kataragama Main Road running along the southern coast of Sri Lanka. The main campus that consists of the Administrative Complex and the Faculties of Science, Management & Finance, Fisheries Marine Sciences & Technology, and Humanities & Social Sciences, is remarkable for its scenic beauty with the extensive grounds and gardens full of elegant trees embracing the sea breeze. This romantic environment with the elegant university complex is going to be your abode for a few remarkable years of your life.

## **2.1 INTRODUCTION TO THE FACULTY**

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences was founded with the establishment of the Ruhuna University Collage affiliated to the University of Colombo. On obtaining a fully-fledged university status, the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences started operating as an independent body. Now it is a well-established faculty offering Bachelors, Masters and Doctoral Degrees in a wide spectrum of disciplines of diverse character.

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences is the largest faculty of the university having an undergraduate student body of approximately 3000 and an annual intake of over 500 students every year. The faculty offers over 400 course modules in 12 diversified disciplines per annum through the six departments operating under its aegis.

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences grooms the students for a professional and disciplined life by providing them with a broad understanding of the traditions that operate in a wide range of humanistic and social science disciplines; by achieving in them an ability to apply the subject knowledge they gather in class and field to solving problems and carrying out academic tasks in the contemporary world; and by improving their capacity for independent and critical thinking, logical analysis, effective communication, and well-informed participation in teamwork. Hence, the Bachelor of Arts degree programme integrates classroom work, field trips, independent readings and writings with hands-on research, and project work.

The faculty has instituted a computer centre to enhance the students' skills in information and communication technology as focused on the potential needs of the job market. Moreover, it has launched two special programmes to advance the information technology skills and English language proficiency of the undergraduates under the IRQUE (Improving Relevance and Quality of Undergraduate Education) project funded by the World Bank. A Cultural Centre has been established to carry on all types of cultural activities. A Centre for Modern Languages is established to make sure that the students have opportunities to improve their language abilities well beyond their mother tongue.

The faculty is composed of six departments as follows:

### **3. THE COURSE UNIT SYSTEM**

#### **3.1 INTRODUCTION**

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the University of Ruhuna embarked on an ambitious and far-reaching programme of curricular reforms in 2001 in order to address growing concerns about the decline in the academic quality as well as the relevance and usefulness of the existing Bachelors degree syllabi and evaluation procedures. The faculty's curricular reforms directly address the major issues surrounding university education in the Humanities and the Social Sciences as identified by the staff, the students, and the community at large. The proposed reforms attempt:

1. To reduce the routine practice of learning.
2. To reduce the widespread tendency of students passing examinations without attending classes.
3. To create a better learning environment.
4. To promote interdisciplinary training.
5. To reduce possible overlapping of the course contents across some departments.
6. To facilitate a greater flexibility and provide a wide range of options for students to choose subjects within the same discipline.
7. To create facilities for poverty-affected students to learn while working.
8. To provide opportunities for visiting scholars to offer full-scale courses.

The new system introduced to the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences is a *semester system* with course units based on course credits and it is currently in usage in most universities in the world. The basic philosophy behind the semester system is to provide a greater flexibility and choice for both students and lecturers in organizing their study programmes. The adoption of the semester system makes our study programmes internationally compatible.

#### **3.2 MAIN CHARACTERISTICS**

Under the course unit system, the academic year is divided into two semesters and the duration of each semester is limited to 15 weeks.

- A course unit or module represents an organized meaningful fund of knowledge. It is a part of a subject and has recognizable boundaries

demarcated with objectives, subject contents, and a framework of assessment. It defines the prerequisites the students should have fulfilled for offering the relevant course unit and how it articulates its relationship with the other course units of the same subject and the other related subjects. The terms "course unit" and "courses" are synonymously used in this document.

- Each course offered in a semester has 3 or 4 contact hours a week. A contact hour may include formal lectures, discussions, review sessions, tutorials, and other forms of standard activities that support academic interaction between the lecturers and the students. The lecturer decides how to utilize the contact hours assigned to each course.
- The abstract value assigned to a course is counted in credit points on the basis of the number of contact hours allocated to it in the weekly programme. For example; a three-credit course means that the students will have three contact hours with the lecturer in every week of the semester and a four - credit course means a course including four contact hours a week. Most of the courses are designated as three-credit courses and in some cases four-credit courses. The terms credit, credit point, and credit hours are used interchangeably.
- Students are expected to carry out a minimum of four such courses (12 credits) each semester for full-time registration. Only full-time students are entitled to hostel facilities and other such university benefits (*Mahapola / Bursary grants*).
- A student reading any given subject at the university level needs to have a certain irreducible minimum of knowledge in that subject. Therefore, every subject has core courses and elective (optional) courses.
- Since the modern employment sector demands several transferable skills, we are obliged to give due recognition to the development of such skills. The third category of courses is called "Foundation Courses". (English Language Proficiency, Computer Applications, Basic Mathematics, Reproductive Health, Physical Fitness and Health Management etc.)
- Students are entitled to exceed the minimum number of courses required for a degree program. Such additional courses offered are called *non-credit courses*. They too have academic requirements for the students to fulfill. All such non-credit courses offered and the grades earned for them will be listed in the academic transcript but the non-credit course grades will not be counted for determining the *grade point average (GPA)*.
- Without fulfilling the assignment requirements, a student may attend a course on non-credit basis with the consent of the relevant lecturer, and this is considered *course auditing*. No formal registration is required for this and such courses will not be listed in the academic transcript.
- A department may propose any number of courses. Syllabi and lecture

programmes are available to all students at the commencement of the semester.

- The students are evaluated at the end of the semester on the basis of their performance in each of the courses offered. The course grades are generally made available to the students one week before the beginning of the next semester. The method of evaluation may vary from course to course.
- The relative weight assigned to various components of the assessment scheme may vary depending on the course design.

### **3.4 COURSE CODES:**

Each course code has a three letter prefix to indicate the subject/department and a four digit number to indicate the level and semester. For example, ECN 1101 indicates that it is first year course in Economics offered in the first semester. All first year courses are represented as 1000 level courses and the second year, third year, and fourth year courses are as 2000 level, 3000 level and 4000 level courses respectively.

### **3.5 REGISTRATION FOR A COURSE:**

Generally, in order to read a subject at the university-level, a student is supposed to have offered it first at the GCE (A/L) Examination. However, there are certain subjects that are not represented in the GCE (A/L) Curriculum, and in such cases, the student is advised to obtain prior permission from the respective departments. A student is required to get registered for the compulsory core courses and prerequisite courses prescribed by the relevant department. The special-intake students should follow the subjects they have been selected for as one of the three main subjects during the first year.

### **3.6 CHANGING A COURSE:**

If a student wishes to change a course, he/she should do it within the first two weeks of the semester of the first registration by making a formal request to the Dean of the Faculty, on a duly completed *S2-Form* available at the Course Unit Coordinating Office.

### **3.7 ASSESSMENTS:**

The Course Coordinator (Lecturer) provides a description of the relevant course unit, including information about the subject contents, the dates for assessments, the time allocated to each identified topic, the readings and the consultation hours. A C1-form prepared by the Course Coordinator provides the student with all the information they need including the syllabus and the detailed scheme of assessment.

### 3.8 COURSE UNIT CO-ORDINATING OFFICE

The Course Unit Coordinating Office handles the overall administration of the course unit system. It, as the intermediary body, coordinates all the matters between study programmes and students.

## **4. DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS**

### **4.1 INTRODUCTION**

Economics deals with issues arising from the conflict between human demand for goods and services and the limited supply of resources to satisfy these demands. In brief, economic inquiry may be regarded as the study of choice. As it stands, difficult policy choices often need to be made in the following traditional problem areas: Inflation, Unemployment, the Balance of Payments, Economic Growth, Exchange Rate, Stability, Agricultural Marketing, Labour Relations, Free Trade and so forth. More contemporary areas, to which Economics may make a contribution, include Poverty Alleviation, Regional Disparity, Natural Resources and the Environment, Foreign Ownership, Privatization, and Aging of Population.

### **4.2 UNDERGRADUATE STUDY PROGRAMMES**

The Department of Economics offers both General and Special Degree programmes in three disciplines namely;

- i. Economics
- ii. Social Statistics

### iii. Political Science

The Economics Degree Programmes are designed to improve understanding of important economic problems and to provide the tools needed for critical analysis of these problems and dealing with them in practice. These programmes are also intended to make students aware of the nature of economic science and of the directions in which, economic theory is moving. The Department of Economics conducts undergraduate programmes suited to the needs of students with a variety of interests and assists those who want to become professional economists.

The students who seek to specialize in Economics, Social Statistics and Political Science, are selected on the basis of their performance at the 1000 level course unit examination at the end of the first year. Special Degree Programmes are designed to guide them in an in-depth study of the respective disciplines. The other students study these three subjects as part of their General Degree Programmes.

The Degree Programme in Social Statistics is aimed to train students as Statisticians who can analyze social problems on quantitative bases, and make significant decisions that are very essential for the development of the society as well as the economy. The students who follow the Social Statistics course are trained to use more advanced computer applications for problem-solving purposes.

The Special Degree in Political Science is designed to intimate the students with the theoretical and practical aspects of different political ideologies. Further, students are trained in new directions of Political Science and are acquainted with the current political issues of the world.

## **5. DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY**

### **5.1 INTRODUCTION**

Geography seeks to understand, analyze and explain the reciprocal relationships between man and his activities and the environment, both physical and built-in pace, space and time. As this definition suggests the scope of the subject is very wide. The wideness of the discipline has made to embrace a large number of related subjects.

The Degree Programme in Geography envisages realizing two main objectives;

- To provide a geographical knowledge and understanding of physical and social environment leading to the development of a geographical prospective. It has frequently been communicated by graduates in Geography that the Geographical point of view is very much in demand in the formulation and implementation of development activities.
- "Through Geography" it is expected to develop and improve students' skills that will enhance their value in the world of work.

At the beginning of university education in Sri Lanka in the 1920, Geography was introduced as a subject to the university curriculum system. Since then, Geography has continuously been a popular subject in university education.

The department of Geography was established on the 1<sup>st</sup> of January 1979 with only 3 academics, 1 non-academic and 50 students. The department had been housed in the Teachers' Training College at Eliyakanda until it was shifted to a new building complex with a unique architectural landscape in Wellamadama in 1984.

To date, the department has produced about 750 special degree graduates and about 5 postgraduates and currently around 200 undergraduates are pursuing General and Special Degree Programmes.

## 5.2 UNDERGRADUATE STUDY PROGRAMMES

At the undergraduate level, the Department provides General and Special Degree Programmes. The students who seek to specialize in Geography are selected on the basis of their performance at the 1000 level course unit examinations at the end of the first year.

## 6. DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY & ARCHAEOLOGY

## 6.1 INTRODUCTION

The Department of History was established at the inception of the university as one of the most important and key disciplines of the faculty. Many graduates produced by the department have made significant contributions to the development efforts of the country as well as to archaeological and historical research in the Southern Region of Sri Lanka.

At the national level, the department is anticipated to take up the challenge of filling the gaps in historical and archaeological research, investigations and explorations in the Southern Region and the Ancient Ruhuna. The Department of Archaeology under the Ministry of Heritage and many other institutions in the field seek expertise from the department in various types of research on Sri Lanka's history.

## 6.2 UNDERGRADUATE STUDY PROGRAMMES

The Department of History offers study programmes leading to Bachelor of Arts General and Special Degrees in History and Archeology. The History deals with the study of change and development of the human past from the origin of writing around 4000 B.C., while the Archeology studies the human past right from the origin of the human kind about three to four million years ago.

The Department has designed foundation courses in History to train a beginner to have a general understanding of the evolution of the human species and the historical foundations of the emergence and expansion of the ancient civilizations. The General and Special Degree Programmes are orientated to making the student aware of the major historical changes and developments of the world by giving him/her a clear knowledge and understanding of the economic, political and socio-cultural developments in his/her own country from ancient to modern times.

Under Archaeology programmes, the courses are designed to give the student a deep and clear understanding of all aspects of the discipline by focusing his/her attention on the rapid changes in world archaeology and major theoretical and methodological advancements in the subject, while special emphasis will be given to the study of the Sri Lankan culture right from the earliest human occupancy of the island.

A standard thesis should be produced by the candidate by carrying out independent research in a relevant area of sociology under a supervisor appointed by the senate. The degree is awarded on the basis of the successful completion of the dissertation and the oral examination held on it.

### **Ph.D. Degree**

A standard thesis should be produced by the candidate by carrying out independent research in a relevant area of sociology under a supervisor (or two supervisors) appointed by the senate. The degree is awarded on the basis of the successful completion of the dissertation and the oral examination held on it.

**Note: - Regarding PhD studies, the candidate is initially required to get registered for an Mphil programme, and thereafter, depending on the academic quality of his/her work, he/she may be transferred to the PhD programme on the recommendation of his/her supervisor/supervisors.**

## **10. ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHING UNIT (ELTU)**

### **10.1 INTRODUCTION**

The English Language Teaching Unit (ELTU) functions under the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences and caters for all the seven faculties in the university, facilitating the undergraduates to improve their proficiency in English as one of its primary objectives. The ELTU also employs a good number of visiting instructors in addition to its permanent staff.

### **10.2 COURSES OFFERED BY THE ELTU ON-GOING COURSES**

The ELTU conducts for the students EAP courses in their respective disciplines throughout their stay at the university. These courses are introduced at three levels, as 1000, 2000 and 3000. It is compulsory for the students to pass all these three levels in order to qualify for the award of the degree.

#### **EXTENSION COURSES**

##### **Certificate and Diploma Courses in English for Employment.**

As a community development activity the ELTU extends its services to members of the public who are interested in improving their English language proficiency by conducting weekend courses in Professional English.

The participants in these courses are mostly employees in both public and private sector organizations and young adults pursuing their education in various academic institutions especially in the Southern Province.

##### **Diploma in English for Employment**

The Unit also conducts a Diploma course in English for the English Language teachers aspiring to improve their language as well as pedagogical expertise in English.

## 11. Computer Centre

### 11.1 Introduction

With the aim of enhancing the information technology skills of the undergraduates of the faculty, the Computer Centre was established in 1999 as the central information technology education centre of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. The centre is responsible for Teaching IT for the students of the faculty. The number of students in all 4 years is about 1600 annually. The Computer Centre is currently well equipped with physical resources to provide quality ICT education and services for the members of the faculty community in particular.

In keeping with this, the centre is utilized as IT examination center for the IT related course units conducted by all the department of the Faculty of HSS. More over, the computer centre has made significant achievements in developing digital programmes necessary for the smooth and effective functioning of the faculty.

### 11.2 Facilities of the Computer Centre

The Computer Centre serves the students and staff members of the HSS Faculty while all its laboratories have been utilized as an information technology examination centre by the six departments of the HSS Faculty in conducting their IT related course units.

#### 11.2.1 Computer Teaching Laboratories

The Computer Centre has 02 computer teaching laboratories which accommodate 70 computers at present. **In terms of expanding the IT infrastructures of the centre, a new building space has already been allocated for installing 60 computers with internet facilities under the HETC project.**

All the available computers in the Computer Centre are networked and provided with Internet facilities while each laboratory, air-conditioned and comfortably furnished, is equipped with a multimedia projector, a white board and a screen for projectors.

### **11.2.2 Web Server**

The Computer Centre is maintaining a fully functional website covering all the information of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences.

### **11.2.3 Internet and E-mail Facility**

All computers of the Computer Centre are interconnected to the Local Area Network (LAN) of the University Wide Optical Fibre Backbone and the Internet and networking facilities have been extended to a larger number of users including all the students and the academic staff of this faculty of Humanities and Social sciences.

### **11.2.4 Scanning Facility**

Scanning facility is provided by the Computer Centre for the all the students and staff of the faculty. If necessary, Assistance is provided by the staff of the Computer Centre.

### **11.2.5 Other utilizations of the Computer Centre**

- Research and other academic activities of the students.
- Conducting IT Training Course for Academic Staff (This will cover hands-on experience in both common computer applications and subject-specific computer applications needed to the academic staff of the Faculty of H&SS)
- Research and online studies of the postgraduate activities.(several staff members are following online Master Degrees)
- Research, Information collecting through Internet and other activities of the academic staff of the Faculty.
- Facilitating IRQUE IBG II - IT Courses of the Faculty. This course is offering final year students of the Faculty targeting the job market.
- Day to day academic activities of the undergraduate students. (Research, information collecting, continuous assessments works, other computer application activities.)

- Special IT events of the Faculty.
- Special IT events of the “UNISOIT IT Society”.

#### 11.2.6 PHYSICAL RESOURCES:

- Two Computer Laboratories (Lab 1&2) of the centre equipped with over 100 Computers and Internet facilities.

## THE COLLECTION

The current collection of books at the library totals to more than 140,000 volumes covering all aspects of academic activities at the campus. The initial collection was mainly built through significant donations from the Asia Foundation, the British Council, the Netherlands Literature Programme, Asia Development Bank and Japanese Foundation. The collection at the main library comprises mainly of books on Pure Sciences, Applied Sciences and Social Sciences. The Library also subscribes to approximately 300 journals. ## **REFERENCE SECTION**

The References Section consists of four main sub-divisions, namely:

- i. General Reference area
- ii. Permanent Reference area.
- iii. Sri Lanka Collection
- iv. Periodical Collection

## **GENERAL REFERENCE**

The books in this section are issued only for overnight reference. The term "Reference" is given to all reference books as an identification tool.

## **PERMANENT REFERENCE**

The permanent reference area holds basic reference sources covering the fields included in the curricula of all faculties. Dictionaries, Encyclopaedias, Yearbooks, Maps etc. are available in this section. The books in this section are not given out on loan and can be used only within the library. The books of this type are labeled 'Reference only' or 'Not to be Taken Away'.

## **SRI LANKA COLLECTION**

The Sri Lanka collection comprises mainly of publications in Sri Lanka. Theses presented for Postgraduate Degrees and other research works by students and staff and the collection of Professor W. Justin Labrooy are kept in this section. The books and other materials of this section are not allowed to barrow. Publications of government departments and cooperations are at present kept in this section. It is opened from 9.0 a.m. to 4.00p.m. on week days.

## **PERIODICAL COLLECTION**

This section consists of approximately 300 local and international journals. Periodicals are not given out on loan but contents of the current periodicals are photocopied and distributed among the academic staff and can also be obtained on request.

## **REFERENCE DESK**

The Reference Desk offers the following services:

- \* Assistance in finding answer to specific reference questions.

- \* Assistance for researchers
- \* Instruction in the use of the Library and its resources.
- \* Verification of the library holdings and referral to institutions for rare materials that the library lacks.
- \* Orientation to the Library through seminars, subject specific workshops, etc.
- \* Compilation and production of various instructional aids.
- \* Online search service
- \* Data Services helps researchers to identify, evaluate, and access numeric data.
- \* Introduction to new library technologies
- \* Research consultation services

## LENDING SECTION

Lending facilities are available to students, academic staff members and non-academic staff of the university. Users can borrow books from the lending section for the period of up to 2 weeks and extensions may be granted for another two weeks unless the books are reserved by other readers. Students will have to present their student identity card and library cards for the purpose of borrowing.

## 16.3 ISSUING OF LIBRARY BOOKS

All registered internal students have the right to use all library facilities including lending facility. Users of the library are required to fill and submit a specified form for their registration. In the registration process students should produce their Student Record Book with the Identity Card or National Identity Card. After the registration a student can burrow books as listed in the table below from the university library.

- After the registration, your student ID will be your membership

card.

- A User Account is created for each registered user.
- You will be given a User ID and Password to access the Account.
- Your temporary Password should be changed and set your own one by yourself immediately after getting the membership.
- Your ID should be produced each time you borrow or return an item.
- You should login to your account after transaction and verify whether issuing/return records are accurate.
- If there is any incorrect record, you should inform it to the librarian within seven days after the transaction.
- Facilities are available to renew your borrowings (once only) without coming to the library. The renewal should be done on or before the due date.

## **LATE RETURNING**

It is charged Rs. 1 for a lending book and Rs. 2.50 for a reference book on the late submission per day. For further delay, Rs. 3 is charge per day. If it is impossible to submit a book on the due date a reader should inform the librarian by a letter indicating his/her inability. If a reader wants to keep the same book few more days than required it should be renewed.

## **RETURNING OF LIBRARY CARDS**

Readers should return their cards and books kept with them on completion of their study period or in any case that causes to suspend the studentship. All library resources on loan must be returned, and all outstanding fines be paid, when a student leaves the university. Users who fail to fulfill their obligations may have their degree certificate withheld until they have returned the books and paid the fines.

## **LOST / MISSING LIBRARY MATERIALS**

If a borrowed material is lost or damaged, the matter should be reported to the Library immediately. The borrower has to replace it with a new copy of the same edition/ subsequent edition within the due date. If it is not available in the market, you will be billed for the replacement cost of the book plus a

processing fee of 25% of the value of the book.

#### **16.4 PHOTOCOPY SERVICE**

The library established an instant photocopy service for the benefit of its users. The service is provided on the ground floor. Readers can obtain copies of a limited number of pages from reference materials (e.g. periodicals, exam past papers) which are labelled Reference Only.

#### **16.5 INTER LIBRARY LOAN SERVICE (ILL)**

ILL service supplements the resources of the Ruhuna Library materials by borrowing or obtaining materials from other libraries. The service is available free to all students, staff of the faculty who have a valid library card. Users are notified when material is available and the items are picked up by the Library Counter. All materials must be returned to Library Counter on or before the date of return. Materials returned overdue are subject to fines.

#### **16.6 HELP DESK FOR LIBRARIAN SERVICE**

The library provides answers, sources, research helps and information about library collections and services by E-mails, Telephone calls and faxes. The response time is usually may be 24 hours. These workshops introduce the research processes, the use of the internet, CD ROMs and online databases, and the location and retrieval of information. Workshop dates and time are posted near the reference desk and the library web (URL: <http://lib.ruh.ac.lk>). Bookings may be required.

#### **16.8 LIBRARY RESOURCE CENTRE**

The open hours are form 9.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. on week days except on Mondays. The section is closed at 1.00 p.m. on Mondays. The registered users are required to allocate time for the use of the Resource Centre at least a day before they want to use. The Library Resource Centre provides following facilities

- Video Centre - Facilitates a group of 12 users at a time
- Audio Centre - Facilitates 12 individual users at a time
- Computer Lab - 20 users can occupy at a time
- Library Auditorium - can be used for 80 users with the modern electronic facilities

#### **16.9 COMMON RULES AND REGULATION FOR LIBRARY USERS**

1. A borrower is completely responsible for the books borrowed from the library. It is the duty of the borrower to inform the authorities about any damages or missing parts noticed in the book(s) he/she borrows before leaving the library.
2. Students should produce their identity card together with their library cards when they make a request to take out books.
3. It is a must to keep silence in the Library.
4. The librarian has the sole authority to call back a book before the date.
5. When students are in the library they should keep their student record book and identity card with them.
6. Smoking, group discussions, chatting, reading aloud and misbehaving are completely prohibited in the library.
7. Misbehaving within the library and damaging books and library properties causes suspension of the studentship.
8. Students are not allowed to carry unauthorized materials into the library such as personal books, personal files etc. and are allowed only to carry blank sheets of paper.
9. Outsiders are allowed to enter the library only on permission from the Librarian.

The staff of the library is always ready to serve you and the librarian has the sole authority to change rules and regulations any time.

## **17. MEDICAL CENTRES**

### **17.1.1 Main Medical Centre**

The main medical centre of the university is located in a building close to the Department of Physics. It is staffed by a chief medical officer and two other medical officers and a supporting staff. The centre provides preventive and curative care to students and employees including their family members. The provision of the health care is in the form of daily outpatient service, medical laboratory service and other services including medical examination of staff and students and issuing of medical certificates. A public health officer (PHI) takes care of the preventive health aspects of the university, which includes among others, food hygiene, waste disposal, environment sanitation, water sanitation, and epidemiological work. During the academic year, the

medical centre is open for treatment for students as well as staff from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekdays. All drugs are free of charge for students. If a prescribed drug is not available in the clinic the university will reimburse the expenses incurred on purchasing it from outside.

A dental clinical unit also has been established in affiliation to the medical centre.

### **17.1.2 MEDICAL TESTS FOR NEWCOMERS**

A medical test is compulsory for all newcomers. Students are supposed to get the medical test done by a Government Medical Officer (M.B.B.S) using the prescribed form sent from the university and should submit to the university medical officer.

The aim of this test is to determine whether the student has suitable health conditions to continue the academic programme without difficulties. If a student is found to be suffering from a severe disease, he/she will be directed to special clinics for treatments.

### **17.1.3 MEDICAL CERTIFICATES**

If a student is unable to attend lectures and/or practical classes due to an illness he/she should inform the university medical officer immediately. If a student wishes he/she can receive medical assistance from a government or a private doctor. However, the medical certificates issued by them should be approved by the university medical officer.

If the student were unable to complete a part of an examination or a full examination due to specific illness at the course of examination it should be informed to the Medical Officer and the Senior Assistant Registrar of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. The Medical Centre will issue certificates only for the students who have taken treatments from there. The certificate needs to be claimed **within 3 days from the treatment**.

If a student had outside treatment, a medical certificate issued from a government hospital should be provided under the approval of university Medical Officer to the Senior Assistant Registrar of the Faculty of Humanities not later than 7 days of which he/she had failed to sit the examination. In the event of taking outside treatments for a communicable disease, a medical certificate issued by a public health inspector (PHI) or a government medical officer of the respective area (DMO) can be submitted. If the illness lasts more than 14 days, another medical certificate is required for the days in excess.

A medical certificate from a consultant even of a private medical centre is accepted if it is submitted within three days after the period of illness.

The Ayurvedic Medical Centre is located in the upper floor of the Peoples Bank Wellamadama Branch building near the post office of the university. It is opened on week days from 8.00 am to 4.00 pm and the consultation hours are as follows:

8.30 Am - 12.00 noon, 2.00 pm - 3.30 pm, Saturdays 8.30 pm - 12.00 noon

Other than the ayurveda medical facilities psychological a counselling service is also conducted. All these services are freely available for the students and the staff of the university and their family members.

## 19.1 FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO STUDENTS

### MAHAPOLA HIGHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS

The University Grants Commission sends application forms to all University entrants to apply for this scholarship. The duly completed forms should be returned to the University Grant Commission by the student. The student's parent's income, the number of siblings studying under 18 years of age, the distance from his/her home to the university and the district level are considered when granting the scholarship. A merit scholarship is granted according to merit level achieved by the student at the GCE (A' Level) examination.

### BURSARIES

The students who are not granted *Mahapola* scholarships are eligible to apply for bursaries offered by the university. The university calls applications for bursaries from university entrants. Family income, the number of siblings studying under 19 years of age, and the distance from his/her home to the university are considered when granting the bursaries.

### BURSARY GRANTS OF THE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION

This will be awarded to a student who has passed the 1000 level examination and whose family income is less than Rs. 32,000/=.

This will be awarded to a student who has entered the university from *Walgama Maha Vidyalaya* or *Sujatha Balika Vidyalaya*, Matara, as the top scorer at the GCE (A' Level) Examination.

This will be awarded to the student who specializes in Sinhala, being the highest scorer in Sinhala at the 1000 Level examination.

■ **BENNE WICRAMASEKARA SCHOLARSHIP**

## **21. EXAMINATION REGULATIONS (INTERNAL)**

Regulations governing the conduct of Examinations

### **EXAMINATION RULES**

1. Candidate shall be in attendance outside the examination hall at least 15 minutes before the commencement of each paper, but shall not enter the halls until they are summoned in by the supervisor.
2. On admission to the hall a candidate shall occupy the seat allotted to him and shall not change it except on the specific instructions of the supervisor.
3. No candidate shall be admitted to the examination hall for any reason whatsoever after the expiry of the first half-an-hour period from the commencement of the examination. Nor shall a candidate be allowed to

- leave the hall until a period of a half an hour has lapsed from the commencement of the examination or during the last 15 minutes of the paper.
4. A candidate shall have his/her student record book and the admission card with him at the examination hall on every occasion he presents himself for a paper. His candidature is liable to be cancelled if he/her does not produce the record book. If he fails to bring his record book on any occasion, he/she shall sign a declaration in respect of the paper for which he/she had not produced the record book in the form provided for it, and produce the record book on the next occasion when he/she appears for the examination. If it is the last paper he/she is sitting, he/she shall produce the record book to the registrar on the following day. If the candidate loses his/her record book in the course of examination, he/she shall obtain a duplicate record book/identity card from the registrar, for production at the examination hall.
  5. No candidate shall have on his/her clothes, or on the admission card, time table or record book, any notes, signs or formulae etc. Books, note parcels, handbags etc. which a candidate has brought with him should be kept at a place indicated by the supervisor/ invigilator.
  6. No candidate shall copy or attempt to copy from any book or paper or notes or similar material or from the scripts of another candidate.
  7. Examination stationery will be supplied as and when necessary. All materials supplied, whether used or unused, shall be left behind on the desk and not removed from the examination halls.
  8. Every candidate shall enter his index number on the answer book and on every continuation paper. He shall also enter all necessary particulars as indicated in the cover of the answer book. A candidate who inserts on his script an index number other than his own is liable to be considered as having attempted to cheat.
  9. A script that bears no index number or an index number which cannot be identified, is liable to be rejected. No candidate shall write his/her name or any other identifying mark on the answer script.
  10. All calculations and rough work shall be done only on paper supplied for examination and shall be cancelled and attached to the answer script. Such work should not be done in admission cards, time tables, question papers, record books or any other unauthorized paper. Any candidate who disregards these instructions runs the risk of being considered as having written notes or outline of answers with the intention of copying.
  11. Candidates shall stop work promptly when ordered by supervisor/invigilator to do so.
  12. Absolute silence shall be maintained in the examination hall and its precincts. A candidate is not permitted for any reason whatsoever to communicate or to have any dealing with any person other than the Supervisor / Invigilator.
  13. In the course of answering a paper, no candidate shall be permitted to leave

the examination hall temporarily. In case of an emergency, the Supervisor / Invigilator shall grant permission to do so but the candidate will be under his surveillance.

14. No candidate shall contact any person other than Vice Chancellor, Dean, Head of the Department or the Registrar regarding any matter concerning the examination.
15. Every candidate shall hand over the answer script personally to the Supervisor / Invigilator or remain in his seat until it is collected.

## **EXAMINATION OFFENCES AND PUNISHMENTS**

### **CLASSIFICATION OF OFFENCES**

Examination offences may be broadly classified as follows:

1. Possession of unauthorized documents and removal of examination stationery.
2. Disorderly conduct of a grave nature.
3. Copying.
4. Attempting to obtain / obtaining improper assistance or cheating
5. Impersonation
6. Aiding and abetting in the commission of these offences.

### **PUNISHMENTS**

1. Cancellation of candidature for the part of an examination, from a subject, or full examination in which the offence was committed.
2. Cancellation of candidature for a year or number of years including the one in which the offence was committed.
3. Cancellation of candidature for a lifetime.

## **22. CENTRE FOR DISTANCE AND CONTINUING EDUCATION (CDUE)**

The CDUE Unit of the University of Ruhuna is located at the top floor of the administrative building complex.

The unit was established in 1997 and has shown tremendous growth in terms of number of students registered and the degrees offered. The number of students registered in the EEU in 2008 was accounted for 2,903 and the total number of student enrolment has increased nearly up to 36,000 for the period 1997 to 2011.

The unit offers the BA General Degree in Arts and is operated under the wings of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. While providing tuition

for external students is beyond the scope of the unit, closer to every exam it conducts a series of reinforcement seminars known as 'Prethiposhaka'. It will be advertised in the press when calling applications for registration every year.

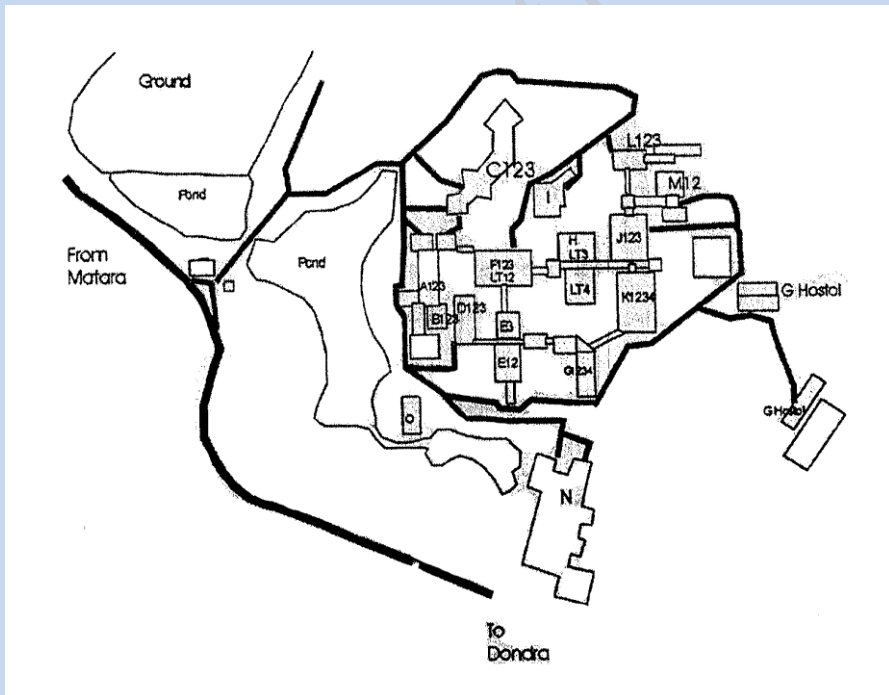
